MEETING WITH NCC PLANNERS ABOUT LONGHIRST HALL



The Parish Council held an extraordinary meeting in December which was well attended by residents, councillors and two senior officers from NCC's Planning Department (Mark Ketley, Planning Manager and Joe Nugent, Senior Planning Officer). The officers were left in no doubt about the level of concern over the scale of developments that NCC were approving in the grounds of Longhirst Hall (a conservation area) and certain activities such as the unauthorised felling of mature trees. (NCC had taken enforcement action over the trees once residents had reported the matter).

Residents of Micklewood are experiencing a variety of problems, in particular the closure of the gate behind the Hall which is causing serious access problems through to the Village. The officers undertook to examine the situation and take remedial action as a matter of urgency.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Parish Council met on 5th January.

Broadband - see the Working Party report on page 3.

Bob Jackson raised the issue of the **track at the Colliery** which is still in need of repair. The Clerk said that the farmer concerned had been in touch with him and promised to do the work next week. Bob Jackson has also been in touch with the Highways Department about rerouting **grain vehicles** next season. As NCC would not spend any money to help solve this problem LPC decided to see if there is any improvement when the new Morpeth Northern Bypass is open. The Clerk was asked to send a letter to NCC pointing out their safety concerns regarding the numbers and size of the vehicles using such narrow roads.

Parish Maintenance - Richard Tordoff has been contacting other PCs about the costs involved. Contracts need to be completed before the growing season starts.

Following the meeting about **Longhirst Hall** (see above) it was agreed that the Clerk would contact the Planning Department and find out what progress has been made on the re-opening of the gateway through to the Village.

Planning applications - An application has been received from Mr. Jordon at the Brocks to convert existing outbuildings into a residence for seasonal farm workers. No objections were raised.

The golf club have resubmitted an application to site 150 chalet homes on the southern edge of the golf course. LPC have submitted a reply including concerns and observations.

The **rubbish dumped** $\frac{1}{4}$ mile west of the Village on the bridle path has been cleared. NCC's footpaths unit has re-laid a section of the bridle path.

It was agreed that the **litter picking** group would be supported by LPC in purchasing safety equipment (road warning signs).

The **next meeting** is on **Thursday 2nd March** at 7pm in the Village Hall. This is the last meeting before the A.G.M. All residents are invited to attend.

PARISH BROADBAND WORKING PARTY NEWS

On 1st March 2015 around 70 residents gathered at the War Memorial to protest about the very poor broadband internet service available in Longhirst. At the time we were told that it was unlikely that fibre broadband could be installed in the foreseeable future. Just under two years later we are delighted that a high speed fibre broadband network is now accessible to residents with Ulgham (790/791/794) numbers in the Village itself. To obtain a higher speed broadband please contact your Internet Service Provider.

Linton numbers already have fibre to their cabinet, we have been promised fibre broadband for Ashington numbers within 12 to 18 months and a new fibre cabinet for Morpeth numbers within the same timescale. At a meeting shortly before Christmas residents at The Colliery and Old Moor decided not to continue with a proposed wireless broadband scheme and to wait for the fibre upgrade. This leaves the residents at Broomhaugh and Ashtrees eagerly awaiting developments on a possible fibre scheme for their area of the Parish. We are all grateful to iNorthumberland at County Hall for the improvements that have been achieved so far.

MY FIRST FEW MONTHS OF CURACY

"Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to make Christ known among all whom you serve?"

Serving the people in the Parishes of Bothal and Pegswood with Longhirst in the Morpeth Deanery is certainly busy, but what's different is that there is no bottom line. Over the past few months since my ordination I have had the freedom as Assistant Curate to settle into my role, discover the projects in which I will participate and to work out how much time to devote to each. It was a bit of a struggle deciding how best to fill my diary at the beginning of my curacy, but the freedom to explore what is happening in the Parishes I serve has been a vital part of my settling into a life of ordained ministry and using this period as an opportunity to get to know the people I both serve and share ministry with. It has also helped me to experiment in different places and figure out what my strengths, weaknesses and, most importantly, interests are. I remember leaving theological college like it was only yesterday, feeling nervous about ordination and settling into an area that was totally new to me. I had been used to the busy flow of life in the Benwell area and to serve my curacy in rural Northumberland was a huge change, but a good change-bringing me out of my comfort zone.

A big part of my role is meeting people at different stages of their spiritual journey, whether this is at the Faith and Life course that I help lead with our local Lay Reader, chatting over a meal at Longhirst Village Hall, learning to knit at Pegswood Chapel with a craft group, meeting a bereaved family in preparation for a funeral, welcoming children and adults into the life and witness of the church through the administration of baptism or building up relationships through pastoral visiting.

One thing that has touched me deeply since ordination is what I like to call a 'GOD INCIDENCE.' One day, I went to visit a parishioner in a local care home and met another lady who was confused, crying, and didn't know who, or where she was. She looked up at me (her eyes so red with crying) in a clerical collar. She instantly stopped crying and started to recite 'The Lord's Prayer'. The staff were absolutely astounded, this lady they said hadn't been able to string two words together for months, yet said this prayer without a problem. Sometimes we think we have to use a lot of words to comfort people, that day I didn't speak a single word, I was simply present and she recognized who I was representing. I reflect daily on the promises I made alongside many others when I was ordained, "Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to make Christ known among all whom you serve?" When Jesus said, "whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me," he was speaking about the demographics I am called to serve here: people who are poor in spirit and those who are lonely and mournful. These people have become Eucharistic to me, and I personally experience God through them. Overall, I have developed a service-driven theology in which faith and good deeds are, as Martin Luther once suggested, as inseparable as fire and heat.

I'm really loving my curacy, working, praying and sharing the good news of Jesus Christ with and alongside those whom I serve.

SNIPPETS OF LONGHIRST HISTORY

Between 1916 and 1919 Ashington Airfield operated from a field to the west of the lane from Longhirst Station to the Ashington Road. Now that the opencast has been filled in you can see a tall group of trees in the shape of a cross on the right. There was a hangar and a few buildings to the south east of the airfield. The remains of one of the buildings, which probably housed explosives, can be seen from the road. B and C flights of 36 Squadron flew from there in 1918. 525 Special Duties Flight, part of 256 Squadron, also flew DH6s on coastal patrols.
