PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



Meeting held on THURSDAY 7 SEPTEMBER

Peter Coates referred to the recent sad deaths of Jon Mills and Ian Thompson. The Chair and Vice Chair and a number of Councillors past and present attended both funerals. The Parish Council is indebted to them for everything they did for the Parish and they will be very sadly missed. Donations to the nominated Parish Council charities of both families were agreed.

Northumberland County Council Update – Cllr. David Towns reported that there has been an increased number of complaints around verges being overgrown, or conversely being cut back too much. He is keeping pressure on the County Council to continue its road maintenance schedule.

Planning Issues - A number of residents attended to discuss the most recent planning application for Station Cottages. One resident asked if there was any time limit or expiry date after which an unauthorised building would be allowed to remain. David Towns explained that this can happen but only where no objections have been raised. That will not apply in this case because a number of objections have already been submitted. Peter Coates confirmed that the Parish Council remains opposed to the development of this site and a letter of objection would be sent to the County Council.

Longhirst Colliery - Julie Murray reported that the damage to the woods caused by Storm Arwen has still not been rectified. The County Council has confirmed that the woods will be tidied up and the paths cleared, but there is no timescale for when this will happen. The woods are not safe underfoot, particularly for the elderly, and accidents have recently occurred.

Residents have witnessed tractors mounting the pavements and forcing pedestrians off the path. Peter Coates suggested he could take this up with North East Grains if he is given full details of the date and time of such incidents and the vehicle involved.

Councillor Vacancies - the vacancy to replace Peter Lovering (who has moved from the Village) was advertised and one candidate responded. Bill Climson has lived in Longhirst Colliery for the past 10 years and his application was agreed.

The second vacancy, to replace Jon Mills, remains (see page 3).

Woodland Trust meeting – several attempts have been made to contact the Woodland Trust to arrange a meeting. NB: since the Council meeting a response has now come through and arrangements are in hand.

Ashington Road Flooding – The Parish Council has agreed to take a complaint to NCC's Castle Morpeth Local Area Council in November. The road floods each winter after any period of heavy rain. The Parish Council is asking for the ditches to be cleaned out on a regular basis and for the road level to be lifted.

Potland Park Access - Glen Fahy attended meetings with officers from Advance Northumberland and NCC. He has received assurances that the Park will be reopened but no specific timescale was forthcoming. A number of entrances and rights of way remain blocked.

Land Registry documentation for the Football Field - David Towns confirmed that the relevant paperwork has been submitted to the Land Registry. This will verify the Parish Council ownership of the field, but it may take several months for the paperwork to be processed.

lan Thompson Archive - Ian Thompson collected a significant number of papers related to Longhirst Parish. Richard Tordoff plans to go through them and ideally create a digitised archive. The project will take some time to complete and offers of help will be much appreciated.

IN MEMORIAM

It is with great sadness that we report the recent deaths of Ian Thompson, Norah Dryden, Ruth Hallowell and John Trewick. All will be greatly missed by their families and friends, both within the Parish and further afield. Our thoughts are with them at this very difficult time.

Ian died after a short illness at the beginning of August. He was born in the Village, served as Parish Clerk for many years, chaired the Longhirst Parish Association and regularly maintained the Churchyard before he and Val moved to Consett. His greatest claim to fame was his knowledge of the history of Longhirst Village going back more than two hundred years. He donated his records to the Parish Association and they are now in the archive in the Village Hall.

Norah died at the end of July. She had lived at Longhirst Colliery for 11 years and played an active part in the community until she was taken ill earlier this year. She was on the Residents' Committee and organised a number of Christmas wreath making classes which were a great success.

Ruth moved to Longhirst in the 80's and celebrated her 100th birthday in Foxton Court Care Home earlier this year. She died there in August with her son, John and daughter, Judith by her side. Her funeral service was held at St. John's.



John, a long-term resident of Longhirst, died on 1 June aged 95 years. His daughter, Christine, wrote the following piece.

'It was Dad's dying wish that he could return to Longhirst and have his ashes spread in the Millennium Wood and it would be like he had returned home. I am grateful beyond words to the Parish Council, The Woodland Trust and to Mike Elphick for making it possible for this to be carried out.

It was a bleak rainy day on 15 September when the family planted an apple tree for Dad and spread his ashes in the wood. We hope that it will grow and flourish and that everyone will enjoy it and if you knew my dad please pause awhile and remember him. He had a life well lived.

It was such a long time ago - 1969 to be precise, when we arrived in Longhirst Village. I was only 7 years old then. My father was in his element there and one of the first jobs was clearing the jungle that was supposed to be a garden so we could at least walk down it. Over the years that followed he and my mother turned it into a beautiful space with long herbaceous borders and striped lawn. Dad's large vegetable patch and greenhouse were pride of place. Many years of entering the Village Flower Show followed and taken very seriously.

Dad was very involved in Village life and often called upon to be a Mr Fix it. My mother recalls when he and Bobby Moore (they were often together working), were on the Village Hall roof fixing it. A passerby shouted up "Aren't you a bit old to be up there?" To which my dad replied, " If you think I am old you should see my apprentice!" To which they both nearly fell off the roof laughing!

Another time they decided to clear out a drain that was blocked. Bobby lay down and reached in and in a second slid down into the drain with just his wellingtons sticking up out of the top! Dad couldn't pull him out for laughing till his sides hurt. Every time they told the story they would howl with laughter. There were so many of these tales over the years. He got the Victorian radiators for the Village Hall and fixed the heating, and he was proud of that. Every year he would be seen at the Village Fete setting up and then clearing away at the end of the day. He helped set up the Village Bowls Club and enjoyed playing immensely. Mam and Dad both went and planted trees with the other villagers in the new Millennium Wood. They were just sticks and it was hard to envisage how it would eventually look.

It was a sad day when Mam and Dad decided they could no longer manage the garden and thought it better if they downsized while they still could and moved to Morpeth. He definitely left part of him behind in Longhirst and you could tell he really missed being there.'

Sunday 3 December is Advent Sunday and at St. John's Church, Longhirst, we are holding our **annual Toy Service at 2pm**. This is a wonderful way of anticipating Christmas through the singing of Advent Carols and blessing the Advent Ring. Children are especially welcome and we traditionally get a good turn out from the young peoples' uniformed organisations with their banners. We have done this for many years now, but for newcomers to the Parish who may not have attended before, the idea is very simple. We bring a wrapped Christmas present indicating on it whether it is suitable for a boy or girl and an approximate age. Presents for teenagers are also welcome. During the service the presents are placed at the front of the Church and are later taken to North Shields where they are given to the Cedarwood Trust, a Church of England community outreach organisation, for distribution among less well-off families in the Meadow Well area. This helps some children to have a much happier Christmas than they might otherwise have expected. In past years it has been an enjoyable occasion for all, and we look forward to seeing you.

If you are unable to come to the service, presents can be left in the Village Hall or at the home of our PCC secretary, Mike Elphick, at Howarth Cottage, NE61 3LJ. If this is not possible, please contact me and I will collect them.

VICAR'S LETTER



As many of you may know I am soon to retire from my post as your local vicar and my last Sunday morning service will be at St. John's here at Longhirst on 5 November. I wish I had a pound for every time somebody has said, "Oh, you're going out with a bang then?!" I was "installed" (as they say) at a service held at St. John's on the evening of 28 March 2006 and remember two things very clearly about the occasion. It poured with rain non-stop, so we all got very wet as we made our way up to Longhirst Village Hall for refreshments after the service, but also how

this was more than offset by the warmth of the welcome extended to myself and my family by all who attended. By modern standards seventeen years is a long time for clergy to serve in any one place but we (myself and the family) saw no good reason to ever want to move anywhere else and it has been a happy place in which our children, Alice and Tom, could spend their formative years and attend schools in Morpeth before moving on.

It has also been a very interesting place to work because not only are the communities of Bothal, Pegswood and Longhirst so different, but also the church buildings, which in their unique ways evoke on the one hand, Edwardian Methodism, on another, Victorian Anglicanism and on another the high Catholicism of the medieval world. But what impressed me most, right from the start, was that the church communities at Longhirst and Bothal come together for worship on Sundays and likewise at Pegswood in the Local Ecumenical Partnership where it has been a privilege to share the ministry with Methodist colleagues over the years.

There are of course some particular events that will live fondly in the memory: the Advent Toy services at St. John's and the valuable link with The Cedarwood Centre at North Shields; the Heritage Open Days each September attracting scores of visitors to St. Andrew's Church and Bothal Castle; the poignant Covenant Service each New Year at St. Margaret's, Pegswood, a valuable gift from Methodism; the gatherings in all three villages on Remembrance Sundays; the Tuesday evening youth club which ran for many years in Longhirst Village Hall, the Christingle activity afternoons before Christmas at Bothal, not to mention of course the hugely popular Longhirst Open Gardens weekends, I could go on ...

However, space is limited so I'll sign off with a thought for the day attributed to the co-founder of Methodism, John Wesley.

"Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, With all best wishes and God bless. at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." ... and you won't go far wrong.

THE UPCOMING VACANCY

During the time when we will be without an appointed minister, the oversight of the parishes will be undertaken by the Morpeth Area Dean, Reverend Chris Groocock who is Priest in Charge of Holy Sepulchre Ashington and he will arrange for visiting ministers when services of Holy Communion, Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals are required.

I am also delighted to let you know that on Sunday 24 September in St. Nicholas' Cathedral in Newcastle our Churchwarden at St. John's, Mrs Heather Jackson, was authorised as a Lay Minister in the parishes by the Bishop of Newcastle. She therefore has authorisation to conduct services such as Morning and Evening Prayer, Remembrance and Carol Services. Heather has been in training for this for the past twelve months and she will be a great asset no doubt during the vacancy and beyond.
