LONGHIRST PARISH RESIDENTS' DATA PRIVACY CONSENT

Many of you will already know about the new "General Data Protection Regulations" that came into force on 25 May. They require that persons or organisations, such as Longhirst Parish, that hold personal data must tell us what data they hold and the precise purpose/s for which they hold/use that data. They must also get formal consent in writing in the following areas:-

- consent to our relevant details being held;
- consent to our details being destroyed when we cease to live in the Parish;
- consent to our data being used for the disclosed purposes only.

Longhirst Parish holds data about your names, postal addresses, e-mail addresses and in some cases, your telephone numbers.

The primary purpose is to ensure that you receive by e-mail, or by hand delivery, the bi-monthly Parish Newsletter 'The Longhirst Leader' and the e-supplement sent out during the intervening month. The data is also used to keep you informed about local events and other information of local interest including information about the Longhirst Hundred Club. Your data will never be shared with any other persons or organisation without getting your specific consent in writing.

The meeting planned for $1^{\rm st}$ March was postponed because of bad weather and was held on $29^{\rm th}$ March.

Longhirst Parish

Reports were presented on recent meetings:

a) with a Highways Officer from County Hall which covered the installation of **vehicle speed warning signs** on the B1337 at each end of the Village and the nemoval of the existing sign **perking problems** at the parth and of Main St

the removal of the existing sign, **parking problems** at the north end of Main Street and concerns over **increased traffic** if planning permission is granted for 2 new houses on Dairy Lane.

- b) with a Planning Officer from County Hall which covered proposals to reopen the pedestrian gate at the rear of Longhirst Hall to provide access to the Village for residents of Micklewood Close and the new Longhirst Hall apartments. Also discussed were issues relating to the planning application for the new houses on Dairy Lane and ongoing developments in the grounds of Longhirst Hall.
- c) the Parish Groups meeting, the outcome of which was summarised in the last edition of The Leader.

The Parish Council accepted the recommendations of the Parish Groups Meeting and agreed, if necessary, to **support the future production costs of more paper copies of The Leader** to a maximum of ± 400 /annum and (as a one-off contribution) to **help underwrite the costs of holding an NTC play** in the Village Hall this September for up to ± 100 .

The meeting was pleased to see that the County Council had recently undertaken **drainage improvement works along the Pegswood road** and had started **pothole repair and resurfacing** work at the same location.

A resident from the north end of Main Street had written to the Parish Council concerning the **parking of their car in front of the Village Hall**. The Council supported the Parish Association in their wish to reserve the car park for Village Hall users but were well aware that every effort to improve the parking situation at the north end of the Village had so far failed.

Planning applications: Revised schemes at Fawdon House and Longhirst Golf Course (150 chalets) had been submitted together with a proposal to convert existing barns to residential homes at Potland Farm.

The **Parish Council AGM** was held on 3rd May and Cath Farrell was re-elected as Chairman and Richard Tordoff as Vice Chairman. Ian Thompson was re-appointed as Parish Clerk. There is still a **vacancy for a new Member** and any Parish resident who is interested in joining should contact the Clerk (a). The financial accounts for the previous year and the budget for 2018/19 were approved. Meetings will continue to be held on the first Thursday of every other month.

The Parish Council had submitted its comments on the Longhirst Hall Golf Club planning application for 150 chalets around the course and it was noted that Pegswood PC had employed a specialist consultant to prepare a formal response on their behalf. An application for a change of use for a building behind Longhirst Station was being dealt with by County Council officers under delegated powers.

As a significant number of planning applications are coming forward at present it was agreed that a list would be maintained of all current applications including their NCC Planning Portal number so that details could easily be accessed on line. If necessary additional PC meetings would be called to help the Clerk prepare responses to urgent planning applications.

The Fire Service had recently been called out to deal with a **Village bonfire** which was blanketing the surrounding area with noxious fumes. See below for a note on this issue.

NCC Highways has recently cleaned the footpath alongside the Linton Road and had monitored traffic speeds through the Village. Once the data has been processed it is intended to agree locations for new speed warning signs on the approaches.

The **next meeting** will be held at 7pm on **Thursday 5th July** in the Village Hall and all residents are welcome to attend.

WHEN TO HAVE A BONFIRE

As the season for gardening is well under way, on behalf of the Parish Council I would like to give some guidance on having a bonfire in your garden so that it does not cause pollution, a nuisance or harm people's health.

To minimise the impact on neighbours it would be wise to wait until the wind is blowing away from them, have it later in the day when people are normally inside and avoid starting one when washing is out, windows are open, etc. Green waste that is dry causes the smallest smoke plume but large quantities of wet green waste will cause the greatest nuisance. Tyres and plastics (milk containers etc.) are hazardous. There are occasions where smoke has drifted across the road and become a danger to traffic. You can be fined for this.

If you are not happy about your neighbour's bonfire please speak to them but if the problem persists you may wish to take it further and contact Environmental Health at the County Hall.

You can get rid of household or garden waste by composting or taking it to the Recycling Centre on Whorral bank. The Council also have a green collection bin service that runs from early March to the beginning of December at a current cost of £36 per year.

In brief, the Ashington numbers are now expected to be live by the end of this year. The Morpeth numbers (around Fawdon) and the outstanding Ulgham numbers (around Broomhaugh/Ashtrees) should have their new fibre service by the end of next year. We still live in hope!!!

OBITUARIES

It is with great sadness that we report the recent death of two people who have lived in Longhirst.

VAL BLOCK 1952-2018



Val was born in Newcastle General Hospital. Her musical talent was spotted early and in addition to singing lessons she learned to play the piano, violin and guitar.

Alan and Val first went out together when they were 15 and 16 but it only lasted 3 months. Val then went to Portsmouth Poly, graduated in Sociology and started work in Kingston-upon-Thames as a Residential Social Worker in a Children's home. When she returned home for Christmas one year Alan asked her out for a drink and within a year they were married and set up home in Jesmond. Val

completed her Social Work qualifications and got a job with Blaydon Social Services. She also started singing in Working Men's Clubs in a band called "Hooker".

In 1982 their son Alex was born. Alan's band had split up and he had retrained as a computer programmer and they moved to Ellon near Aberdeen. Three years later their daughter Lucy was born and they soon moved to Cockermouth to be nearer their relations in Newcastle. Music continued to be a big part of both their lives with Val playing in a number of bands and becoming the first musical director of a community choir.

Retirement brought them back to the North East and to Micklewood Close. Val was soon involved in Village life and helped to organise the Village Show. As she enjoyed many crafts including painting, knitting, crochet, breadmaking and flower arranging she entered several classes, many of which she won along with a trophy for the Best Craft Entry. She contributed to the Flower Festival at two Open Garden Weekends, helped on the Craft Stall in the Village Hall and would have opened their garden had access to the Village been better. Val was also a valued helper for a number of special coffee mornings and Val and Alan, together with a few of their friends, provided a very varied entertainment after the Harvest Supper in 2016. This was when a number of Villagers realised for the first time what a lovely voice Val had.

At the end of last year Val was diagnosed with a brain tumour. Alan recalls her initial reaction was "I have had a good life. You three look after each other". She never said "Why me?" and always had a smile for her visitors.

She will be sadly missed by her family, her many friends and all those who knew her.

Following her funeral over £1000 was donated to MacMillan Cancer Support.

PETER ANGUS 1948 - 2018

Peter, a southerner, moved up to Morpeth with his partner Eileen Bowler in the 1980s and Peter contributed in many ways to the life of the town. They then lived in Longhirst for nearly 10 years until Eileen died in 2005 and shortly afterwards Peter moved away. While in Longhirst Peter was an enthusiastic member of the Longhirst Leader Editorial Group; a member of the Luncheon Club where he enjoyed many lively discussions and occasionally walked with the Longhirst Amblers group. He was a colourful character who will be missed by his many friends and colleagues.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS



The Trustees are pleased to confirm the granting of a **Premises Licence** to the Village Hall covering the performance of films, plays, dance, live and recorded music, the holding of sporting events and the provision or sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises.

We have had various improvements carried out during the past few months including the clearing of the vegetation along the northern boundary of the site and the redirection of rainwater from the unsatisfactory soakaway at the south eastern corner of the sports hall into an existing drain further along the back wall. This will have a drying effect upon the rear car park. LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Hedgehogs and Honeybees

At this time of year we are beginning to see an increase in activity from **hedgehogs** which are sadly in decline. We can make their lives a little easier by feeding them. Whiskas tinned cat food that is JELLY based chicken (50p from Poundland) is best. Bread is not very nutritious and they should be given water, not milk. If you are concerned about cats taking your food then perhaps make or buy a hedgehog feeding station (I will be happy to give you details 790364).

Hedgehogs require a large area to maintain their food intake needs, especially if the female has a litter of five to look after, and so please leave a six inch gap under your fence/wire for access.

If you see a hedgehog out during the day then it is most unusual. Please ring me and I may be able to give you some help and assistance. This usually happens toward the end of the year and is often an autumn juvenile that needs help.

Also at this time of year we see a valuable part of the **honeybee** lifecycle - the swarm. Swarms are not dangerous, simply the old queen and the flying bees from a hive leaving their original site and looking for a new home. The old queen has laid new queen eggs in her old hive and these will take over. This is the only way honeybees can naturally multiply.

There are at least two beekeepers in the Village. We do what we can to assist the bees with their swarming instincts but they are still wild and have their own agendas. If you see a swarm that has settled in your garden please feel free to phone me on 07850066633 and I will arrange its collection. It often takes the form of a rugby ball but can be as small as a tennis ball. They are not looking to sting you, they are simply resting until the scout bees find them a new home.

There are other types of bees such as Tree Bumblebees that may take up refuge in your bird box. Please also phone if they are annoying you as they can be territorial.
